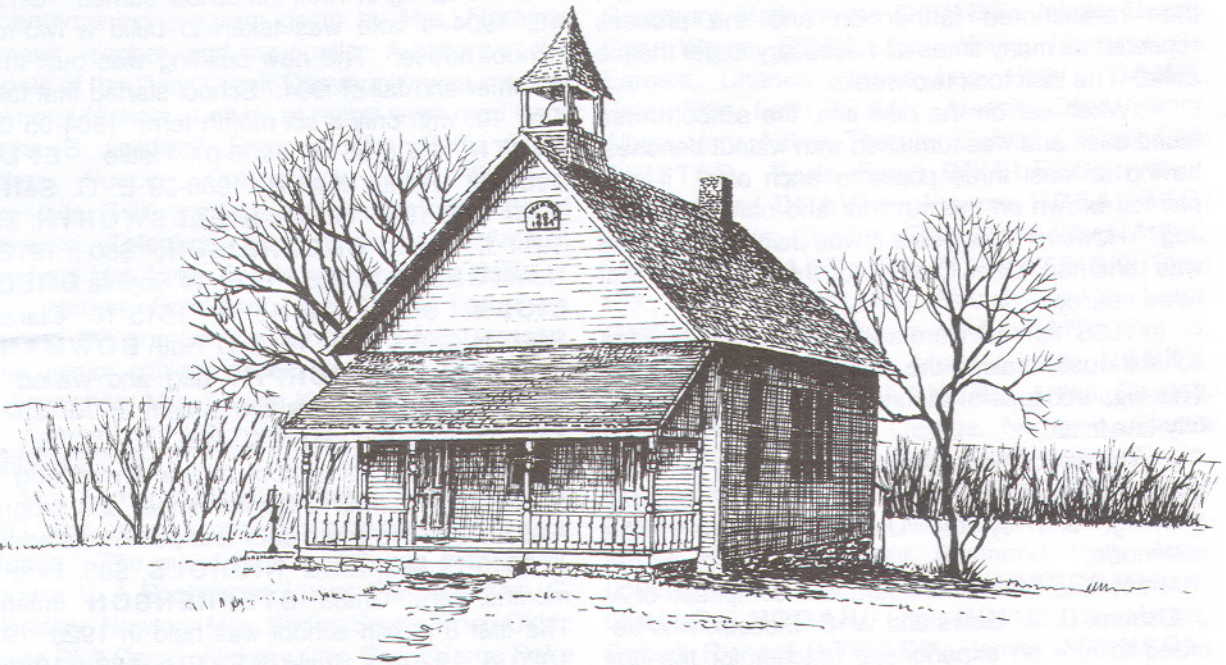

DEER CREEK SCHOOL DISTRICT # 48

In Goldie Daniels' book Rural Schools of Douglas County, she writes the following:

There were at least two early schools in the Stull Community before Kansas became a state. One was about one and one-half miles south of Stull on the farm owned by August Kampschroeder. The other, dated about 1860, was two and one-half miles southwest of Stull near a rock quarry on August Walters' place. This was a two-room log cabin on a bluff at the foot of which was a well, and was a community undertaking taught by a parent or teacher paid by subscription. Children came to it from a good many miles around; church and Sunday school also were held there with a Mr. Brown doing the preaching and living in a house

afterward occupied by Christy Petefish.

The next schoolhouse was a frame building located about one-half mile west and one mile north of Stull on the southeast corner of what is now the farm of Wm. Henry, Jr. now owned by Dennis McCarthy. It was built by Peter Eberhart Sr., for use of his own children, with a teacher hired and paid by him. A year or so later, John Damm, Sr. and Jacob Hildenbrand offered to pay part of the expenses if their children too could go to this school. Other parents then asked for the same privilege and the enrollment thus increased. This school operated for at least five years.

On August 1, 1879, E. S. Land and Lucinda Lane his wife, deeded to the Board of District No.

48, one and one-fourth acres of land described as follows: beginning at the Northeast corner of the N.W. 1/4 of Sec. 36, T.12, R 17, thence running West 12 1/2 rods, thence South 16 rods, thence East 12 1/2 rods, thence North 16 rods to place of beginning. This plot was to return to the original estate, should its use for school purposes be terminated.

Mr. Eberhart's schoolhouse is assumed to have been purchased by the district, and not being centrally located, was moved to this newly acquired site. This was done with a stump-puller and horses. The building had to be anchored every fifty to one-hundred feet, winched forward as far as it would go, then re-anchored further on and the process repeated as many times as necessary to get the job done. The task took two weeks.

When set on the new site, the schoolhouse faced east, and was furnished with walnut benches, having at least three pupils to each one. It was painted brown on the outside, and named "Brown Jug." However later years it was painted white and was renamed "Deer Creek," for the little creek that flows nearby.

In 1895, ten feet were added to the length of the schoolhouse, making the size about 20 X 40 feet. This was because of the increase of pupils making fifty-one in all.

The schoolhouse was used by the Lutheran congregation for church services on Sunday morning, and by the United Brethren in the afternoon.

At this time the district board was composed of A. J. Osborn, D. W. Dews and W. O. Slusser, who decided to hire an experienced teacher for the first time. A well was dug, but surface water and dirt from the creek when it rose after a heavy rain, made this well unusable, so another was drilled and the work done by C. L. Cantrell, as the cost of \$257.78. No records of schools were started until 1897-98. In researching a record was found for school district #48 on Aug. 9, 1877., where three voters elected a committee to examine the treasurer's report. Elected were George W. Rake, William Herschell and Tracer Hoole (?), William Buck was elected director for the coming year which was to start Oct. 15th with a seven month school term.

In the spring of 1904 the school burned. On May 12, 1904 a vote was taken to build a two-room school house. The new building was built in the summer and fall of 1904. School started that fall on Oct. 10. with only a six month term. 1904-05 D. F. **SMITH**; 1905-06 & 1906-07 Hattie **EPLEY**; 1907-08 Arthur **KALB**; 1908-09 E. In 1917 J. E. **MURPHY** dug and walled and hauled the material for the cistern all for \$62.77. 1917-18 George **MOSS** \$70., closed a very successful term of school at the Brown Jug last Firday April 4 with a basket dinner and program. Also in 1918 the south door and porch was added.

1918-19 Mrs. Elmer **NICHOLS**, \$85. taught 2 months, Mrs. Grace **STEPHENSON** finished; The first 8 month school was held in 1920. 1919-1920 & 1920-21 Susie **BEYER**, \$80.; 1921-22 Ruth **ANTHONY**, \$95.; 1922-23 Bertha **BARNETT**, \$95.; 1923-24 Sarah L. **SMITH**, \$85.; 1924-25 Raymond **HOFFSOMMER**, \$85.; 1925-26 Mildred **WILSON**, \$85.; 1926-27 & 1927-28 Mrs. Jessie **GLENN** \$150.;

In 1929 the basement was dug and a furnace installed. 1928-29 & 1929-30 Elnora M. **HUSS**, \$185.; 1930-31 Jessie **GLENN**, ; 1931-32 Stella **BRAZIL**, 1932 to 1937 Carrie **HANNA**, \$70 to \$85.; 1937 to 1941 Edith **LUDLAM**, \$70 to \$76; 1941-42 Rosemary **SCHEIER**, \$75. ; 1942-43 Mrs. Leland **YOUNG**, \$90.; 1943-44 Rosemary **SCHEIER**, \$130.; 1944-45 Edna B. **SOLOMON** \$ 159.; 1945-46 Anna Mae **HURD**, \$159.; 1946 to 1949 Nadine **TROWBRIDGE**, \$159 to \$225.

In 1953 a gas heating system was installed. 1949 to 1955 Mrs. Josephine **DRAKE**, \$262 to \$400.; 1955-56 Freda M. **HAYES**, \$400. The first 9 month school was held in 1957. 1956 to 1961

Florence **DEMERETT**; 1961-62 Mona **THOMAS**. No school records can be found for the years from 1957 to 1962.

On May 23, 1961 a Centennial Reunion was held at the Deer Creek school in what was called the "Good Old Days". Former students, teachers and friends gathered at the schoolhouse in honor of last day of school and home coming. Mrs. Russell Spencer and Mrs. Roland Kraft assisted by Louise Kent and Nova Smith presented each visitor a sunflower and name tag. The sunflowers were made by Mrs. Glen O'Connor and Mrs. Russell Spencer.

Approximately 180 guests were present to see the entertaining program given by Mrs. Florence Demeritt, teacher, and her pupils. A history of the schools of the Deer Creek Community was read by Raymond Nichols. Letters of regret were read from Martha B. Caldwell, Emporia; Mrs. Hattie Epley Tucker, Pueblo, Colo; Opal Stull Rugges, Escondido, Calif. and Mrs. Jay (Josephine) Drake of Lawrence. Telephone greetings were received at noon from Mrs. Lottie Dravis, Westminster, Calif.

William Schneider, age 91, of Tecumseh received the present for being the oldest person. Other senior citizens were: Mrs. F. J. Buchheim, 87, Lawrence; Mrs. Louise Kropf, 90, Richland; H. W. Swadley, 87, Richland; C. B. Slusser, 89, Richland.

Mrs. Esther Hoffsommer Iwig of San Leandro, Calif., was given a prize for traveling the farthest distance. The guest from a distance were; Rev. and Mrs. V. J. Boehringer, Lucas; Rev. and Mrs. C. R. Findley, Newton; Mrs. Bertha Sears, Enid, Okla.; Alberts Stull Casey, Midway City, Calif.; Verna Rake Brownson, Kansas City; Mr. & Mrs. Robert Corzette and family (Ruth Selch) and family, Meadville, Mo.; Marie Schellhorn, Charleston, S. C.; Arthur Kalb, Baldwin; Shirley Casey Tackett and son, Midway City, Calif.

In 1962 the school was closed and consolidated with other districts. Some students went to Berryton and others to Lecompton. Beginning on the last day of school a covered dish luncheon was served with a school program following. On Friday, May 25, 1962 students gathered for the last day for a final school program. 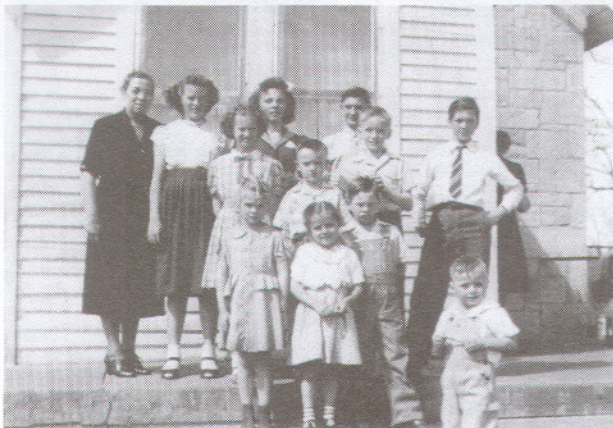

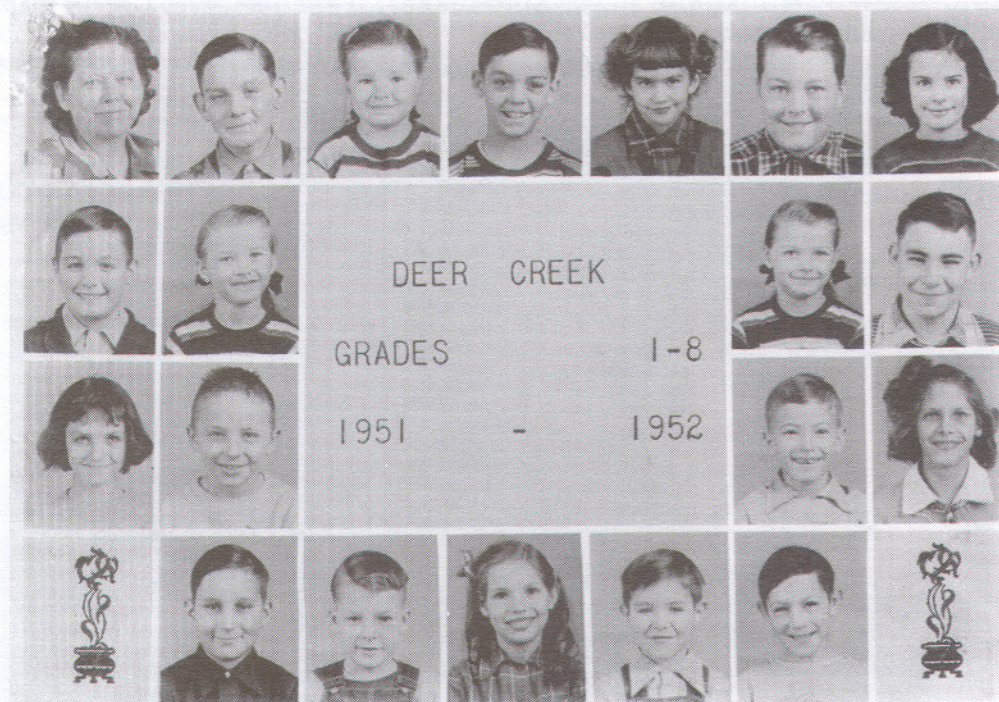
